At first, I was working on a story collection for my thesis, but by my second semester working with David Anthony Durham, it occurred to me that I if I didn't try to write a novel in grad school, when would I try? My first attempt at a novel with David didn't work (though the notes from that semester is helping with another book.) I tried again in my third semester determined that I would finish a novel by the end of the program, and that was how it all began.
